“ My memories of Randy started when we were selling carpet together in Salt Lake City while recovering from some surgeries. He was a big strapping young man towering over me but always had that big grin and usually a Dr. Pepper in his hand. After 6 months of healing we decided to go back to installation and I was willing to give this young buck a chance as a partner installing together. What a great choice because Randy had lots of experience and training that I never had and he shared it with me. Randy was strong as an ox and loved to do the heavy work, cutting, carrying and stretching while I was able to lay tackstrip, pad and do the seaming and trimming which fit us both really well. We sometimes had to go golf because the job wasn't ready for us, some times we went to Wendover Nevada where Randy would give me \$100 to gamble with and taught me all sorts of games where I could lose his money. As long as he had someone to go with he was happy to do it. Well, actually he was happy to do it alone but I like to believe he liked me there with him. We worked together for 5 years and built a good reputation and made lots of friends, which is one of Randy's strengths. He had some stubborn streaks in his personality, like being told to get the carpet laid on a job that was not ready and that is just what he did; over the pile of bricks in the center of the living room and the pile of sheetrock on the floor. He would say, " I just did what they told me to do".

Randy also had some OCD characteristics as well. Such as a case of Dr. Pepper in his fridge, and 7 cases next to it, or when he liked Gatorade, 4 bottles a day in the summer was normal but the 40 or 50 he kept in the apartment was something I just laughed and shook my head at. He gave the Swann's food truck driver a key to his apartment so that he could keep his freezer full of whatever Randy wanted but it was seldom 1 or 2 of the item but usually 6 or 12 because when Randy liked something, he really liked it. When Randy got caught by Linda, he became a better Man and Father and finally a good husband. Not always easy for either of them but always an adventure and when you have a really good friend, you want them to find happiness and joy, which is what I saw happen to my best friend. Rough edges began to be chipped smooth, his

capacity to love increased because it had to in order to handle all of those children that Linda brought into their relationship. I am forever grateful that she could see what he could become if given the chance, Thank you Linda, and I hope to be given one of his bear hugs when we meet again. Until then, I will hold on to sweet memories of great adventure and friendship.
